LETTER CONTEST OPENED

The theme for the 1962 Freedoms Foundation letter writing contest, which opened on July 22, is "My Freedoms and My Responsibilities." Hundreds of Air Force and other service members are expected to submit entries in quest of the \$8,500 in cash awards offered for the best 101 letters.

The top prize in the contest, which closes on November 1, is \$1,000 and the George Washington Honor Medal. The next best 50 letters will receive \$100 each and a medal, with the final 50 winners being rewarded with a \$50 each prize and a medal.

The contest is open to all members of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty. Letters should be of 100 to 500 words on the announced theme. Each entry should include the writer's signature in full, rank, serial number, branch of service, unit and home address.

This year's military phase of the program is based on a statement by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara that, "Our fighting men should know the positive values of the freedoms which the nation is calling them to serve."
